What is Orange Shirt Day?

Orange Shirt Day is a campaign about being kind to kids, that EVERY CHILD MATTERS and should be treated with kindness and respect!

How did Orange Shirt Day begin?

In 1973/74 a child named Phyllis had just turned 6 years old and attended a residential school. Phyllis's granny bought her a shiny orange shirt for her first day of school. Phyllis was proud of this shirt, especially since her family didn't have a lot of money. When she arrived at the school, they took away her shirt and gave her a uniform to wear. They never did give Phyllis back her shirt. From this day on, the colour orange reminded Phyllis how her feelings didn't seem to matter while she attended the residential school. Tips for Picture Day



Picture day is an exciting time for students and families. It's a rite of passage each year that hopefully results in a portrait of a smiling kid that can be proudly displayed.

However, picture day is busy, and every child has a unique temperament. While there are bound to be a few frowns or silly faces, teachers and parents can work together to set kids up for the best possible success on picture day.

Guide kids in selecting outfits: Letting kids have a say in what they wear on picture day is a wonderful way to capture their personality.
