Devereaux Elementary

Moberly Lake Elementary

Discovery Science came to visit Moberly Lake Elementary and students completed their own chemistry experiments. Mrs. Demeulemeester's class has also been busy growing bean plants! As part of the science experiment they have been observing the plants growth and recording it.

Moberly Lake Elementary has connected with park rangers and archaeologists through Skype which is an amazing learning opportunity for the students.

The school took a group of 30 grade 12 students back to the camp for an overnight trip. The event was a success and the school is hoping to make this an annual event. Interim Audit

The 2018/19 interim audit has been completed and the audit procedures to date have revealed no major weaknesses in internal controls.

Don Titus School Closure Update

The capacity utilization rates in the three elementary schools in Chetwynd continue to be that all students could fit within two schools. In September 2018 the recommendation to proceed with the proposed school closure of Don Titus Elementary was made in consideration of the condition of the building. With the uncertainty of the provincial funding model review there is concern regarding the accuracy of potential cost savings. The Secretary Treasurer stated will not be bringing forward a recommendation to proceed with the first bylaw reading of the school closure for Don Titus Elementary school. The enrolment situation will continue to be monitored in Chetwynd.
